
2026: The Year of Reading

Reading helps children grow in confidence, imagination and understanding of the world—and together, we can make 2026 a year full of brilliant books and joyful reading experiences for every child.



Ask your children what activities they are doing each month to celebrate the year of reading in school.

Spotlight on... Retrieval

Each newsletter we will include some questions that you could ask your child, focussing on one area of reading comprehension.

Retrieval involves finding and recalling information that is clearly stated in the text. These questions can be asked before, during and after reading.


- ❑ Who are the main characters in the story?
- ❑ Where and when does the story take place?
- ❑ Can you find a word or sentence that tells us...?
- ❑ What does the text say about...?

You may notice that your child can read the book they bring home quite well, or it is a book they have read before. This is completely deliberate!


Each book should be read at least three times. Once for fluency, once for comprehension (understanding) and once for prosody (expression!)


Every newsletter I'm going to ask members of staff to share their favourite books with us! Let's see what staff enjoy reading...

Mrs Harland




I liked the scariness of these books—I felt really grown up when

reading them


Mr Irwin
